Our Governance System Using Sociocracy: Part Two

ociocracy is intended to be a horizontal structure that pushes authority out to the level at which decisions, policies, and planning need to be made by those doing the tasks and what they need to succeed in accomplishing those tasks. In most cases there is still a bit of hierarchy, given that owners or board members are ultimately responsible to the health and wellbeing of the organization as a whole. In the case of the Goodenough Community, we have a board, and they are responsible to the "outside world" to maintain our organization in good standing with the laws and regulations of our local, state, and federal governments.

The general circle is different from the board. The general circle is made up of the double links—the roles of operations lead and representative of each of the circles in the next ring out. We call them daughter circles: Community Economy Circle, Lifeways Circle, Sahale Circle,



and Communications Circle. The general circle is to do the long-range planning for the organization, stating the domain (area of responsibility) and selecting the operations lead for each of the daughter circles. Likewise, each daughter circle is responsible to create its own granddaughter circles, designate who the operations lead is for each one, elect people for the other three roles, and what each circle's domain is. Depending on the scope of work in granddaughter circles, they may or may not need another set of more circles for specific tasks.

Functions of the four roles. The operation lead carries the work from the General Circle to the daughter circle. The representative of the circle represents the people and their work by reporting back to the General Circle decisions and activities of the circle. The operations lead and the representative are the double link – the inflow and outflow of information between more generalized and more specific circles. The Administrator is the notetaker and keeper of the files of proposals, notes, agenda, and decisions made. The facilitator is the person who runs the meetings of each circle. To keep power distributed more evenly, an operations lead cannot be a facilitator within the circle where they hold that role.


Sociocracy has evolved over many decades. Since sociocracy is designed to be flexible, adaptive, and self-regulating, there are many versions of sociocracy being uses by organizations, businesses, and agencies large and small. What is described here is our understanding and use of it. We are still learning how to use sociocracy to govern our community.

Sahale Circle

Sahale Circle's domain is Sahale Retreat Center, Sahale Learning Center, and Sahale

Ecovillage. Aims of the Sahale Circle: It has the responsibility and authority to take care of anything that pertains to Sahale—by the breadth of its land borders and the depth of its uses, by people and nature, which will sustain, protect, enhance its survival long into the future. Areas of care are facilities, land stewardship, residents and guests needs, economics, administration, culture, and lifeways, each, and all in alignment with the Goodenough Community's vision and mission. These areas of care are represented by these four daughter circles: Constructed Systems, Operations Systems, Nature Systems, and Human Systems.


This intense and joyous week-long event is a communal experience of personal growth and relational development within a rich culture with art, music, dance, song, drama, and more.


