The Teacher

"The first word I think of when I remember John is that he was a teacher." When those words were shared at the cremation ceremony for John, those present felt the rightness in the statement. Teacher became the first word to describe John in his obituary which follows. Many of the cards and messages I have received in the past few weeks describe John as a compassionate teacher, mentor, coach, and of course friend. John taught with his life whole-heartedly and wanted to demonstrate a way of life based on life-long learning, good feeling, and connection. A few years ago, an old friend sent John the image above letting him know how much his teachings continue to shape her life.

Passion for teaching, love of the students, and love of the subject being taught are the first three of 12 qualities of that great teachers share according to a Washington Post article by Valerie Strauss.

As I was talking around the fire with our three returning workaway friends: Ashley, Maddie and Peter (without prompting) each let me now how much they learn at Sahale and love the

culture that encourages learning.

Having just returned from 10 days away, I'm happy to be home and was warmly greeted. I knew I needed to be away from busyness and have time to reflect, feel, cry, meditate, read, rest, share time with an old friend, and experience the comfort of the natural world of the Pacific Northwest. Especially relaxing was the flotation experience I had of floating in a dark, small pool for an hour in a spa in Blue Lake, CA.

John and I had many road trips in our life together and they often included planning and writing for the next project. As a visionary, John was always looking ahead for the next right subject to address and the inspiration often came during a long drive.

The Celebration of Life for John on **March 17** will provide an opportunity to share our feelings and put words to some of what John taught. John's ashes will be spread in four areas on the land at Sahale—the empress tree near the white tent site, the grieving tree in the meadow, the river, and the cedar grove. We will gather at **3:00** p.m. in the Kloshe living room to receive directions and come together as a group. We can't fill the hole that John has left but we can make a whole to honor him and the Teacher he is.

John Lawrence Hoff, beloved teacher, husband, father, grandfather, brother, and friend passed away on Valentine's Day, February 14, 2018. He died peacefully at his home in Mason County surrounded by family and friends after being in Hospice care for 10 weeks.

John was born in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, July 7, 1935. His father was part of the team building the Alaska Highway and John spent his early childhood years in the Yukon, a source of many wonderful stories. He was graduated from the Canadian Nazarene College in 1959 and obtained a doctorate in Theology from the Pacific School of Religion, Berkeley, in 1966. A post graduate

program in Community Mental Health prepared John for his private practice in marriage and family counseling. John dedicated his life to community development and was the Executive Director of the Goodenough Community in Seattle until his retirement in 2013. In John's words, "I have become a communitarian and believe that the influences that make us distinctively human come from participating in a community. I express my appreciation to the leaders,

members and friends of the Goodenough Community. I have valued the opportunity to serve and teach spiritually, relationally and educationally helping people develop their fullest capacity." With a very big heart, John was a loving friend to many. John valued creativity and encouraged people to take their creative impulses seriously. John has left a vast legacy of teachings and he will be greatly missed.

John is survived by his beloved wife, Colette (married 1980), sons David of Seattle and Larry of Burien, daughters Laura Young of Phoenix Arizona and Amie Aylward of Seattle. Three grandchildren, Sophia, 11, Liliana 8 and William Raymond (Wiley) almost 2, gave John great joy.

A Celebration of Life will be held March 17, 2018, at John's home in Mason County at 3:00 p.m.

Sahale is an expression of our vision of community, of folks helping folks. A daily practice.

Vision is where everything begins. We all live according to a vision. We flow down it. That's easy to do. It is something we are all given by parents, schools, and our friends. It is also echoed by all the media, even the funnies. We are flowing towards a vision of a glorious future brought to us by the corporate world. That vision is even in my alumni magazine. The magazine sounds great letting me know what a fantastic place my university is. Things are getting better and better. I just have to work harder and be more ambitious. Get more education. The carrot is dangled in front of my nose so I will chase after it.

Isn't it odd that our cultural vision does not value friendship? I wonder if that's why I didn't bother to stay in touch with my friends. I left them to go chasing after that carrot.

Right now our country's vision is being imparted by its wealthy elite who control virtually all of our media and educational institutions. This vision is leading us to a place we don't want to be. We need an alternative vision.

I can talk about the military industrial complex and the deep state until I am blue in the face but ultimately it is our country's cultural vision that needs changing. It takes education to do that. Most specifically it takes relationship.

Would it not be nice if we could be exposed to people from all over the world? Especially from different ethnic groups? Networking with others will help us get out of our little corners. That's what it takes for me to have an impact.

No matter our political views, we are all hungry for people to be real with each other. That's what is necessary for trust. Without trust we will not be able to hold our ruling elite to account. Relationship is essential to democracy.

I need to be listened to and drawn out. The Goodenough Community have had nearly 50 years of practicing to do just that. For me the Human Relations Laboratory is the foundation for a sensibly built culture able to wisely choose its leaders. Relationship should be basic to our whole educational process starting with kindergarten and continuing through life. It doesn't end with a university degree.

It is important that I can trust the adults in leadership to make the right choices, to actually have my interests at heart. When leaders ignore us we all suffer as a result. Our nation's leaders at all levels need to be trustworthy. Too much is at stake.

Next month we will have a workshop on Sociocracy facilitated by Diana Leaf Christiansen, a well-known community leader. Tools for the tool box. This will enable us to link up with other communities to accomplish what we can't do alone. An alternative to the hierarchy our nation has now.

I can remember when I was the only person at Sahale most of the time. Now quite a few folks are living with us. Our numbers have grown.

When we work together we grow together. That gives us power we otherwise would not have.
